Thursday 7th September - Stothert & Pitt Crane Restoration Project

Come along and hear first hand about the group of enthusiasts that have restored and returned an historic crane that was once used in a Wiltshire stone quarry to the city where it was first built nearly 160 years ago. The Stothert & Pitt Crane Restoration Group have completely re–assembled the six–tonne hand crane on the site in Bath where it was originally made. The crane was made circa 1864 and is thought to be the oldest surviving crane built by Stothert & Pitt in the world.

August Speaker - Baz of Lavender & Co.



Lavender is one of the best-selling items at garden centres now and it's easy to see why once you appreciate the many uses and delights of this wonderful plant. Baz gave us a most interesting, well-illustrated talk, in the course of which we learned that

Cleopatra used it to

seduce Mark Anthony, and Hildegard of Bingen swore by it for headaches!

The Mediterranean variety was brought here by the Romans (who else!) in 43 AD. They used it in baths and for laundry, and the name comes from Latin "lavare" – to wash. In the 12th century, monks used it for cooking and medicine, and we now mainly see the English variety which is better suited to our climate.



Bees love lavender but it repels slugs and harmful insects. It can be used to make biodegradable confetti, soap, hand cream, marmalade, jam, and cocktails with gin or vodka. It soothes burns and colds, and eases backache in a hot bath. It's also great for getting to sleep and for aromatherapy, but you must use natural lavender oil for this, not the synthetic stuff.

Sixteen of us joined the first walk in August around the old mining village of Rowberrow. Along side of a fast flowing stream, we followed the old 'Slaggers Path' once used by miners of calamine, a mineral used in the making of brass. Climbing to the edge of Black Down we arrived at Dolebury Camp, an Iron Age hill fort now owned by the National Trust. It is 600ft above sea level with superb 360 degree views of Somerset and across to Wales. After descending through remains of a medieval warren we arrived back at Rowberrow for refreshments at the Swan pub.
