# Thursday 5th October - Darshill and Bowlish Heritage Project

The Shepton Mallet hamlets of Bowlish, Ham and Darshill lie on the west side of the town, nestling in the valley of the river Sheppey. The Sheppey was once the 'powerhouse' for the cloth making industries which thrived in Shepton Mallet in the 15th – 19th century (wool) and 19th – 20th century (silk). Remnants of the

buildings used by those industries can still be seen in Bowlish, Ham and Darshill and our speaker, Ian Keys, will guide us around the stories, families and history of the area. Ian first spoke to our u3a in 2019 and now he returns to update us on the Heritage Project and its' findings to date.

# Our September meeting - Stothert and Pitt Crane Restoration.

An interesting insight into restoring an historic crane back to where it was first made. The same company made treadmills for many Prisons, including our own here at Shepton Mallet.

# Visit to Avalon Archaeology - 5th September

Several members of Wells u3a joined us on a beautiful sunny morning for this fascinating visit. The Archaeology site is part of Avalon Marshes, near Westhay, and is very attractive, with a lovely shop and pleasant cafe.

We were given a guided tour lasting nearly two hours, by the very well-informed Richard Brunning, who showed us the Iron Age roundhouse, Roman Villa and Saxon Longhall, which have all been reconstructed by volunteers over the last few years. We learned all about the building materials and methods of construction, absorbing some idea of what it was like to live in these buildings. The Roman Villa was voted the most comfortable as it was the only one with heating! That expertise was sadly lost for hundreds of years after the Romans left



Finally we had a close look at the Viking ship reconstruction. The Walrus was built of oak by a team of Danish boatbuilders and was originally displayed in the Maritime Museum in Falmouth. These ships had one large sail and could cover great distances. It seems the word "starboard" for the right side of a ship comes from "steerboard", a piece of wood attached to one side at the back, for steering!
